with reputations for great taste. Shop locations are a decorator's dream, and include Paris, London, Brussels, New York City, Los Angeles, Connecticut, San Francisco, New Orleans, Atlanta and the Hamptons. You can search by genre or time period, and find everything from 18th-century antiques and brand new wares to an Arne Jacobsen dining table and chairs for \$15,000—then contact the store directly or make a bid right through the site. Two of our favorite finds: a 1970s Totally Tubular Sling Chair in hot pink ultrasuede from Space107 on Horatio Street in Manhattan, and the contemporary black lacquered Muirfield Bench from Downtown in Los Angeles, both shown here.
